## Questions for Chapter 4

1. “The first thing—and we could argue, the only thing—that really matters in following Jesus is the process of getting God into men and women (114).” What do you think of this statement? What’s wrong with it and what’s right with it?

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2. “If you don’t feel an urge to follow and become like Jesus, God isn’t at work in you (117).” How would our Wesleyan theology help us to refine this claim?

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3. Is there a relationship between a monastic self-denial and the self-denial that enables us to say yes to God? (121) If so, what is it? If not, why not?

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4. "Jesus reveals our mission *en route* (124)." What does this look like? Do you have an example to share?

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5. Rather than test, etc. to discover gifts, Hull recommends two questions. First, to five close friends, "What am I good at? What strengths would you affirm in my life?" Second, "Where's the fruit or impact of my work? (126)." What are your thoughts on this suggestion?

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6. Hull believes that becoming like Jesus involves six issues of transformation. What do you think? Is his least complete? Is there anything missing? Has he overstated the case?

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7. As you look at the list of habits Jesus engaged in on pages 143–144 how do you think people in our congregation would feel about being asked to exercise those same disciplines?

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
